In 1753, it was again published in John Wesley's A Christian Library. Wesley found the service rich and meaningful. The liturgy currently used begins with the Invitation which is taken directly from Wesley's service of 1780.



February 9, 2025

Today we will hear Luke's story of Jesus calling the first disciples which is unique among the synoptic Gospels. While Mark and Matthew speak of Jesus walking along the Sea of Galilee and abruptly calling Simon, Andrew, James, and John to follow him, only Luke tells the story of a miraculous catch of fish preceding the call. Our text today offers rich possibilities for reflecting on how God calls ordinary people to discipleship and mission. After all, there is nothing the slightest bit extraordinary about Simon Peter and his fishing partners. They are simple fishermen, and they are simply doing what they did every day. They are minding their own business, cleaning their nets after a long, particularly

discouraging night of work, when Jesus comes along, enters into their utterly normal, mundane lives and changes everything.

Some say that happiness, according to the world around us, depends on 'happenings'. If things go according to what I have planned, then I am happy. But if the opposite is the case, happiness disappears. It is a happiness that comes and goes, it doesn't last. Jesus here is talking about happiness based on God's profound love for us. He is teaching us that if we seek happiness for happiness' sake, we will always be disappointed. However, if we seek God and his kingdom, happiness will be a reality regardless of the circumstances.

The command to "love your neighbor as yourself" means not only to love them as much as you love yourself, but to love them as if they are yourself. We don't live according to the flesh, our "self" defined by and confined to our physical bodies, but according to the Spirit: even though we appear in separate bodies we are all one, in one spirit. You and your neighbor are part of the same body. To love our neighbor is to love ourselves. Today we look at the teaching of Jesus In Luke 6.27-38 in which Jesus lays out the heart of his message: God loves us perfectly—"God is kind to the ungrateful and the

wicked"—and we are to have that same love for others, even for our enemies. And we extend this teaching by Paul's words to the people of Corinth - through 1 Corinthians 15. 35-50 where he tells of the greatest love God has blessed us with, eternal life. Paul says we are raised in a resurrection body which is different from our biological body. But, as with a seed, the first body must die for the second to come. What we sow does not come to life unless it dies; it is sown in weakness and raised in power. To live a life of love is the message and the promise is that we will receive the power of love through salvation

"Lent is a season in which we especially focus on examining our hearts, confessing our sins, and reflecting on the significance of Christ's death."



2025 Lenten Study: 'The Third Day' by Bishop **Tom Berlin**

Bishop Lanette Plambeck and the Minnesota Conference Appointive Cabinet will host a Lenten study around the book "The Third Day. We as a parish will follow along with this weekly study as we gather each Wednesday evening for a brief light meal followed by a short video and discussion time.in sanctuary.

In The Third Day: Living the Resurrection, Tom Berlin uses his gifts of storytelling and understanding the Scriptures to connect the reader to the experiences of several individuals around Jesus in his final days, focusing on new life and redemption rather than loss.

So, let us join Peter, Mary Magdalene, and Thomas as they feel the despair of losing Jesus and the surprise and joy that awaits them in the resurrection. This study traces events around these characters, along with Paul and the disciples at Emmaus, and how the resurrection transforms their lives.

Camp Minnesota prepares for unforgettable summer

Swimming. Campfires. Archery. Crafts. Horseback riding. High ropes.

There is camping opportunities for all ages! Children and Adults!!

"2025 is going to be a really exciting year," Each campsite has new programming, new activities, and fresh spins on camping favorites!

Camp Minnesota comprises Camp Koronis in Paynesville, Northern Pines Camp in Park Rapids, and Camp KoWaKan near Ely. Last year, 123 Minnesota United Methodist churches sent kids to camp, and 950 children and youth had a life-changing camp experience.

What's new?

Koronis has a week-long camp designed for teens, and each participant chooses a specialty to focus on that week. In addition to past specialty favorites like horses and water skiing/wakeboarding, this year they can opt for "castles and cabins."

"This specialty combines the popularity of character-based role-playing games with all that summer camp has to offer," said Ziegler. "Our experienced game-masters are ready to guide our campers into an imaginary world of adventure, treachery, and triumph as they work together to complete the quest set before them."

Meanwhile, at Northern Pines, two of last year's camps are expanding: Books and Crafts Camp, which has historically been for youth in grades five through eight, now has an option for high schoolers as well. Last year, those campers knitted with large needles, made paper using items in nature, and lots of time to read and then discuss what they'd read. Additionally, Night Owls Camp will be back for a second year and will be four nights vs. last year's three. These campers stay up late to explore the stars, the sky, and the sounds at night, and play some games in the dark. Northern Pines is also adding bocce ball to its roster of camp activities, which already includes archery, axe throwing, gaga ball, volleyball, and swimming.

Camp Minnesota offers all the traditional camp activities with some faith-building components—like worship, Bible study, and song—layered on top.

Dan Ziegler noted that one of the special things about camp is that the experience is deliberately "unplugged."

"Kids won't see computers, cell phones, or electronics at camp," he said. "Instead, we play games side-by-side in the grass under blue skies, we develop new friendships face-to-face, we swim and canoe in the sparking natural waters of the lake, we cook many of our meals together outside over glowing embers, we sing accompanied by acoustic guitars and enveloped by the light of tiki-torches and the campfire, we learn firsthand from the faith stories told by staff and counselors, and we fall asleep to the sound of the crickets and the soft light of the moon. Good things happen when we unplug and allow reality to break through!"

Northern Pines has 44 acres of old growth forest. This summer, cabin groups at that site will create their own unique space in the woods where they'll have small group time, Bible discussions, and possibly do some crafts. At Koronis, campers spend most nights in rustic cabins. But "pathway" campers will trek deep into the forest to spend one night in a yurt. They will make "smookies" (s'mores with fudge-striped cookies) at night and cook breakfast over the open fire before returning to camp in the morning.

Both Ziegler and Hobson are excited for the summer and care deeply about campers having a meaningful, fun, and faith-building experience.
